Lionel's December Bee Notes

We are now in the winter months and the bees should be in their cluster and staying within the hive but unfortunately some bees are still flying on unseasonably warm days. This is not good news as they will be using up energy reserves and not being able to replace the stores they are depleting. Therefore it is more important than usual that I give them the top up of fondant this month. If they don't need it, it can stay there until the spring and then be wrapped in cling film and stored until next year.

As the queen has almost stopped laying you may like to take this opportunity to treat with oxalic acid which will kill most of the varroa on the bees but will not affect any already on the larvae in the capped cells. This treatment should be applied when the outside temperature is below 3°C, which is a rare occurance of late.

I have been asked about hive insulation recently and in my experience I have found this is not necessary and indeed the important thing is ventilation. The bees are able to keep warm but not if they are damp. I know some beekeepers think just the opposite but that is beekeeping for you!!

It's now that time of year to wish all our readers a Happy Christmas and an enjoyable beekeeping 2024.

News from the Apiary

The extreme wet weather of the last six weeks has prevented any meaningful trips to the apiary save from taking delivery of the donated kit from a kind member in Rimpton.

As the colonies were so light on stores at the end of August, a lot of syrup was consumed in September without any meaningful colony weight gain. Fearful that the extra feed was stimulating colony growth at a time that they should have been winding down, once they had some weight to them, I ceased. Brian and I popped up on a warm day in October to remove the treatment strips and of our brief glimpses (without taking the colonies completely apart), all had brood, eggs and some stores. I will go up early December and place fondant on all of them as a safeguard for the months ahead but I wouldn't be surprised if we see some losses this winter as fondant and syrup is no substitute for the real thing. I hasten to add that no honey was taken off after the end of May, a testament to the wet and cold July and August we experienced.

Tony is putting together the programme for next year and I hope people will make use of the summer, mid-week early evening sessions for some hands-on beekeeping. It is a magical place up there on a warm evening.

Honey Gingerbread

Men- A perfect recipe for Christmas treats!

This recipe will make around 12-16 large gingerbread men, or 20 gingerbread cookies and they can be kept for a week or so in an airtight container once cooled

Time to make and bake: approximately 1 hour (including 30min chill time)

Ingredients:

4 tbsp of Honey 125g unsalted butter 350g plain flour 1 tsp of baking powder2 tsp of ground ginger175g soft light brown sugar

1 large egg

Method

- 1. Add the flour, baking powder and ground ginger into the mixing bowl.
- 2. rub in the butter with your fingertips until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.
- 3. Add the soft light brown sugar and stir.
- 4. Beat the honey together with the egg, then stir into the flour mixture to make a dough

Wrap the dough in cling film and place it in the fridge and chill for around 30 mins

- 6. Preheat it to gas mark 5 or 190c (170c for a fan assisted oven).
- 7. Take a piece of your gingerbread dough and roll out until it's around 5mm thick.

Cut out gingerbread shapes using a cutter of your choice, circles for simple cookies, a gingerbread man, hearts, stars or whatever cutters you have.

Transfer the gingerbread to your prepared baking sheets, they will spread a little so leave a couple of centimetres between them.

8. Bake in the centre of the oven for 12 mins, they should be a lovely golden brown.

Once baked, leave aside to cool slightly before transferring the gingerbread to wire racks to cool completely.

9. Decorate with icing, sprinkles, whatever takes your fancy!

Insurance FAQs

BBKA have updated the Insurance FAQs 4-10-23 to 3-10-24 The difference between this and version 2, is the inclusion of the definition of a hobby beekeeper: 'In respect of this document the definition of a hobby beekeeper is someone with 39 hives or less.'

As with all insurance, these FAQs should be taken as indicative answers only – the final wording is that contained in the policy and the interpretation rests with the insurance company. You can find policy and confirmation of cover documents at www.bbkanews.com
