

Possible Extension to the 'Bee Space'

We've been thinking that we need more storage space at the apiary for some time now. Where could it go, and how do we do it? were the two main questions. Eric McLaughlin, Joe King and Stewart Gould put their collective heads together and decided that the simplest solution would be to extend the existing building to the right. The existing building is 8 metres long, and we can comfortably add another 50%, so that the building would become 12 metres long in total.

Stewart is drawing up plans and consulting with planners to see if we will be allowed to extend. Nothing is written in stone yet, but as soon as we see if it's possible, we can find out how much it would cost.

Suggestions to add another floor and rent the space out as an Air BnB at £195 per night, weren't even mentioned. April 1st isn't far away.

News from the Branch Apiary - March

At last we are seeing those first signs of spring and the sense that the new beekeeping season is nearly here. At the apiary we have removed the anti -woodpecker wire netting from around the hives, and stored it ready for next year, we have also taken off the metal mouse-guards cleaned them with a good scrub in hot soapy water and stored them. To help the bees keep the brood warm we have inserted entrance blocks and placed the varroa monitoring trays in place. This has given us an early chance to monitor mite levels, which fortunately are very low but it also helps to insulate the mesh floors and make it easier for the bees to maintain the brood temperature at the necessary 96 degrees Fahrenheit, which compares well to our own body temperature of 98.4 degrees.

It hasn't been warm enough to make our first major inspections of the colonies, but we have put a queen excluder on those hives which needed it, but without disturbing the brood nest. A few hives had over-wintered with an extra super on with stores in it, hence we needed to pop a queen excluder in before the queen gets tempted to move up from the brood nest into the super and starts laying in it. Hefting has continued just to make sure that the bees have enough food and those hives which felt a little light have been supplemented with fondant.

We have had ten hives over wintering this year and one colony has died out over the winter. The average annual winter mortality figure for managed hives in the south- west region is 15-18%. The figure for unmanaged colonies is far higher according to all the research available.

Over the winter all the supers and frames, which have been stored have been cleaned and sterilised and are now ready for the new season in the clean shed. Eric's Emporium has been stocked up with foundation frames etc and is available at our Tuesday morning Apiary sessions.

Are you ready? The main swarming season is only probably six weeks away. What will you do if your bees swarm? Do you have enough equipment to house them? We are ready, we have the extra equipment and a swarm prevention strategy. This of course never quite works all the time, bees are full of surprises so you will always need that extra equipment standing by ready.

The apiary is beginning to look very attractive with the early blossom and daffodils out. Our flower beds will soon need a spring weeding so do come along and help us on a Tuesday morning. You will get a warm welcome, a cup of tea or coffee and needless to say a supply of kitkats.

The new season is nearly here!

An Asian hornet was found in a potting shed by a member of the Ash Horticultural Society, Kent on Friday 8th March and reported through the Asian Hornet watch app. The hornet was collected by an Animal and Plant Health Agency bee inspector the same day, and confirmed on 11th March. The finding was around 5 miles from a nest found and destroyed in 2023, near Canterbury, Kent.

On the 20th and 21st of March the National Bee Unit received credible reports of lone Asian hornets.

The first was in Preston, Lancashire at a warehouse with regular trucks arriving from France. A bee inspector attended, set traps and is monitoring the location with support from the local beekeeper.

The second credible report was a dead Asian hornet found in Romford, East London. The specimen was collected by an NBU inspector and sent to the lab at Fera Science Ltd for official confirmation.

From the Chair

Our final Winter Talk was lead by Joe Bleasdale who has recently published a book called 'Honey Without Harm'. This talk was not as well attended as our previous ones but in many ways this suited Joe's style of delivery and it was more conversational than a presentation....I think it would be true to say some of the presentation materials required better eyesight than I have, to access the information but perhaps I need to go to Specsavers..... However, it was really interesting to hear how an experienced beekeeper had developed his practice to keep bees successfully without the use of chemical treatment for varroa. Joe was careful to present the arguments for and against the use of chemicals but through careful observation and management, it was obvious that he had developed a successful chemical free approach which enabled him to raise healthy and productive colonies over a period of almost 40 years. It was also interesting to hear about his experiences of beekeeping at the Newt and Tintinhull.

Our March committee meeting had a very long agenda as committee members reported back and considered priorities for the development of Somerton Branch this year. Amongst other things, we are looking into the feasibility of extending the Bee space (see Stewart's marvellous drawing elsewhere in this newsletter) and whether it is possible to move the Branch library to the apiary. Sarah Kent has done sterling work in maintaining and updating our collection of books and we think they may be more easily accessed and promoted to branch members if accommodated at the apiary. Other committee members have been busy looking into Safeguarding and Health and Safety requirements at the apiary to ensure we are in line with BBKA policy and site specific, whilst we wait for an updated handbook from County. Other possible projects include improved lighting at the apiary, establishing an observation hive and extending covered outside space for humans! There is pond work underway at the apiary and a new liner has been purchased. Eric McLaughlin is planning to approach other road users to the apiary and see if it is possible to do something collectively to improve the road surface...every visit is an adventure at the moment!

There are a lot of events being planned for branch members. Beginners practical sessions start soon and there are a number of visits being planned for more experienced beekeepers too (see the Events calendar). Do join in, if you can. You are sure of a friendly welcome at any event.

Congratulations to David Bates and Suzy Perkins who received their Honorary members certificates at the SBKA AGM. Congratulations also, to the following members who passed their First Aid qualification on Saturday 23rd March-Bernie Perkins, Lisa Letchford, Sue McInnes, Ross Hendry and Jackie Mosedale. Asian hornet trapping

Proprietary Asian hornet traps are sold at ridiculous prices. A transparent yellow plastic cup with a black lid, sold by many of the major suppliers will cost you £6.00 - £7.00, and the recommended bait is dearer than a premium malt whisky, but you don't have to pay ridiculous prices.

The trap shown above is made from 2 x 150mm plastic funnels and a zinc sheet Queen Excluder. The QE slots allow smaller insects to escape while holding Asian hornets. The bait is in a small, hotel breakfast type, jam pot witth J cloth wick, and contains a concoction known on Jersey as Bob's brew. Proprietary version - £23.99 + bait. This version £3.00 + some strong cordial and baker's yeast.

Discounts from BBWear

The Apiinvert can be fed as a 'gee up' in the spring, emergency feeding during the 'June gap' and of course at the end of the season when preparing for winter.


