Somerton Beekeepers May committee meeting

With chairman Eric back from his sojourn in Spain, the meeting was back to its usual format, although several committee members were unable to attend. The meeting was, however, quorate, and for the first time, in a good while, was held at the apiary.

Stewart Gould reported that the Beginners' sessions were going well, with some new demonstrators stepping up to the plate, which is refreshing. The early May session on swarming failed to find a single swarm cell in any of the ten hives. We have, in previous years, had swarms on demand, so to speak. Many of the new beekeepers have got colonies now, and so the sessions have more meaning for them.

Eric has researched the possibilities of holding a stock of frame parts and foundation for National hives and it was agreed to keep a stock of 500 shallow frames (SN1) and 500 brood frames with Hoffman spacers (DN4). There will also be a matching stock of wired foundation available to members. Members will be able top purchase by prior arrangement with Eric on 07910 764069. The stock will be arriving in early June.

County business was concerned with the Bath & West Show where Somerset BKA will again have a stand. Several Somerton members have volunteered to act a s stewards for half a day in return for the freedom of the show for the other half. Brunel microscopes Ltd have donated a LEM SP35 high powered microscope for demonstrating pollen analysis, and this will be sold by a sealed auction. The proceeds will go to Somerset Beekeepers Association.

Our apiary is being included in this year's 'Somerset Farm To Food Trail' and will be open to visitors on Tuesday 19th July.

John Webb was lauded for the extremely generous price at which he sold the division 4 colonies of bees. One colony was purchased by the county and used to fulfil the New Leaf Award.

Steve Horne reported that of the three colonies rescued from West Hatch, one was dwindling, but the other two are doing well, and will soon be moved to the apiary, for onward dispersal to a member or members.

Our first member's home apiary meeting since before covid.

One of the great pleasures of our annual programme has always been the series of monthly Apiary Meetings at members' home apiaries during the summer months. Covid has made these impossible for the last two years and it was a delight to have our first of this year's programme in early May.

Michelle Wilson and her husband kindly invited us to their lovely orchard apiary at Hambridge. Thirteen of us gathered and we were fortunate enough to have Richard Bache as our expert demonstrator. Richard has recently been awarded the National Diploma in Beekeeping. This is the beekeeping equivalent of climbing Everest, and only 94 beekeepers have ever reached such giddy heights, so all our congratulations to Richard, who was assisted on this occasion by his daughter Bryony.

Being May, the main topic of concern was swarming and swarm management. As Richard went through the hives we were able to see two different management techniques in action, the artificial swarm and the Demaree method. The weather was delightful and the bees in good spirits. We could see the oil seed rape on the hillsides around the village, so no wonder the bees were working well.

After an hour or so we adjourned to the patio and Michelle provided us with a lovely tea. It was a great pleasure to sit in the sun and talk bees. Eventually it was time to leave, but we can look forward to our June Apiary visit which will kindly be hosted by Jeffrey Wilson and his wife Pauline at their apiary at Wearne, on Sunday June 12th. Full details will be sent by email shortly.

A big thank you to Michelle and her husband for leading off this year's programme, and making us so welcome.

Apiinvert. Syrup ready to feed bees. Unlike sugar solution it requires no mixing, more readily accepted and less work required for the bees to invert (not wasting energy), more close to a natural food.

13kg 1 - 4 boxes £24 each, 5 + boxes £23 each

Apifonda. If you are venturing on a Queen rearing project this fondant is what you need. Very similar to Apiinvert, it is a paste not a liquid. If a colony becomes light through the course of the winter a dollop of fondant could well be the difference between life and death of the bees.

1 x 2.5 Kg bag £5.00, 1 box 12.5 Kg £25, 2 + boxes £24 each

The Apiinvert can be fed as a 'gee up' in the spring, emergency feeding during the 'June gap' and of course at the end of the season when preparing for winter.


A poser for you

Mind the Gap

We've got away with it for a few years now, but it's always wise to be prepared . Newer beekeepers may not have come across the June Gap, but this can be a time of complete forage dearth. It is not unknown for colonies to starve during the month of June, especially if the beekeeper has taken a crop and not left enough provisions for the bees.

Spring blossom has finished, and the carpets of dandelion are a distant memory. Brambles won't be in bloom for a while yet and lime trees, although prolific producers of nectar in certain years, can't be relied on for consistency. If they are in a giving mood, then mid to late June is their time, but they don't perform every year.

Be prepared to feed your bees if necessary. A thick syrup will give them II they need, but there is a danger of giving them too much, and they could place it in the supers where it may get mixed with nectar and mistakenly harvested as honey. It is a balancing act, and the best course is not to take too much away as your Spring crop. Leave something for the bees.

The Basic

After you have been keeping bees for a whole season, you can take the first of the BBKA assessments. 'The Basic Assessment' is equivalent to the old cycling proficiency test. Although the syllabus which is available from here https://www.bbka.org.uk/basic-assessment, looks daunting, there is nothing in it that you don't already know, and the vast majority of people who take it pass at their first attempt. It is a practical assessment, more in the form of a conversation than anything else, although you will have to light a smoker and talk your way through a colony of bees, while the assessor poses a few questions.

Now is the time to apply for 'the Basic'. Contact Bridget Knutson at bridget_knutson@yahoo.co.uk or by phone on 0193 742187 and ask for an application form. You will have to pay BBKA £25.00 ut if you pass, Somerset BKA will refund your fee - and you'll get a badge to sew onto your beesuit. Who could want for more?
