Next Meeting – Apiary Meeting
"Swarming and Swarm Control"
lead by Stuart Gould
2:30pm Saturday 19th May
at Marvin Collins' Apiary

Swarming dominates our regular inspections of our colonies. Prevention, or at least "controlling" the swarming is a much discussed subject. Stuart has some techniques to make it easy (or at least not as difficult as you might have thought!). This is his introduction to you:

I have had bees for 10 years now and normally run about 6 - 7 production colonies. Swarming and swarm collection mean that number fluctuates during the season, and like many other beekeepers, I have lost a couple of colonies over the winter - something I will bring into the conversation. Harvest varies considerably, as we have no oilseed rape in the area and the local farmer has been on a concentrated dandelion eradication path. We are therefore dependant on decreasing fruit blossom in orchards, hedgerow plants, particularly bramble, lime trees and gardens.

All of the above does not stop swarming tendencies and that is what I would like to talk about. Swarm prevention is not feasible in reality, but controlling the swarming urge and using it to your advantage is not as difficult as it first appears.

Directions to the May Apiary Meeting

Please note that on a Google Map the road now re-named 'Montacute Road' used to be New Road, which does run into Yeovil Road, once in Montacute.

All members coming to the meeting should head for the Yeovil to Montacute Road. If travelling from Yeovil (the west), there are considerable road works, due to Western Corridor improvements! Travel through the new Lufton estate (being built) & travel towards Montacute. Before you reach Montacute, on your right hand side you will see a Lodge Cottage on a sharp bend. Turn in here & I shall be there from 2 pm to direct parking, which will be inside the field gate, either on hard standing, or grass. If approaching from the east, through Montacute, drive out of Montacute and look to your left, after about 3/4 mile. You will see a lodge cottage near the gates into Montacute House Parkland. Look out for a white figure! It will either be me, or Steve Attrill.

My 'out apiary' is situated in the middle of a Thatchers Cider Apple Orchard! My bees are 'doing their bit' in aid of the Somerset cider industry! If the blossom is still out, it is an absolute joy to walk through.

If any members are unable to walk the relatively short distance to the apiary, I am able to drive my car nearer the site. I can provide three folding chairs for anyone needing to sit for a while. There are no toilet facilities, but some 'private' areas behind hedges & bushes!! There will be limited refreshments available, but I shall offer cold drinks and light bites. I would suggest that, particularly if warm, members do bring their own water supply. Having suffered from dehydration, I know only too well how dangerous this can be.

There are no alternative arrangements, in the event of inclement weather, unfortunately.

For those of you with Sat Nav:- The Lodge Cottage is known as 'Odcombe Lodge' Montacute Rd. Post Code BA22 8TN. This can be confusing as it comes up as Lower Odcombe. Please do not turn into Lower Odcombe, which is on the opposite side of the road.

Homemade Steam Wax Extractor

We attended the recent Apiary meeting in Queen Camel on Saturday 21 Apr where the guest speaker (Mr Pat Lehain) mentioned using a wallpaper stripper as a wax extractor. Inspired by the glorious weather (which lasted until the early evening at least) and concluded in thunder, lightning and all sorts of bee chaos.

Anyway, inspired by Pat's advice, we decided to investigate and actually there are already quite a few working models 'on line'



and we quickly ignored the stainless steel models from the usual bee suppliers as vastly expensive. Digging around the net for some stainless steel (not aluminium as beeswax and this doesn't 'mix') we

found that we didn't want a 2.4m length and again the costs were high. The kitchen sink was the obvious answer as it was bowl shaped and had a hole – ideal. Better still we found a really cheap simple stainless steel sink at B&Q for circa £25 that was both 50cm across and could be easily modified (my wife and fellow beekeeper always chastises me for this word). I plugged the side drain hole (overflow hole) and the tap-hole with a large stainless steel bolt, two washers and nut.

A quick bit of woodworking around the base and some legs attached (allowing a slot for a wax collecting device (bucket or bowl) and the sink was ready. Noting the advice online, we decided to cover the sink with a stainless steel mesh (spare

floor) to capture all the non-wax debris. A standard National brood box (of length 46cm square) nicely

fitted the top of the sink and now all we needed was a heavy roof (to stay put) and a steamer.

The steamer came from Screwfix (there are other High Street outlets to choose from...) for another circa £25 along with a 2 year guarantee. I then used the smaller steamer outlet and built a wooden frame around the steamer part such that it was both secure and closed any gaps to my appalling woodworking skills (I was never a 'chippy'). We filled the brood box with old surplus frames (x12) and put the steamer on utilising rain water. A quick warm up of the device took 10 minutes and then steam could be seen (and dripping wax) out of the bottom drain hole of the sink and into the container. 30 minutes later the wax stopped and we inspected the



results. Success! Noting that additionally the steam nicely sterilises both the frames and the inside of the brood box.

The mesh floor nicely held all the detritus and all the wax had dripped through into the sink and

contained. The device obviously uses electricity but offers several advantages over a solar extractor (size, time, efficiency and beside what sunshine ?), and also doesn't attract the garden bees!

We utilised the device in our kitchen and apart from some slight escaping steam (removed courtesy of the oven extractor), there was actually very little water condensate in the wax container and overall it was a very clean method of reclaiming old frame wax. I'd recommend device to anyone who wants to clean his or her frames efficiently and clearly a super could equally be utilised on the device. This will save considerable time and effort for us, as we try to recycle our



wax brood frames every 2-3 years (subject to the amount of propolis and state of the wax after the season). The wax will now be boiled up in some rainwater and filtered to polish it off for our candle making exploits. Few hours effort and circa £50 we consider worthwhile. The wood was offcuts from another DIY job recently completed.
