Next Meeting – Indoor Meeting
Jim Vivian-Griffiths talks about
"Dancing Bees"
7:30pm Tuesday 16th October
at The Illchester Pavilion

Jim is a well qualified and interesting speaker and has a topic that I am sure will interest us all!

He writes this about himself:

My wife & I have been keeping bees in Monmouth and surrounding area since 2000. We currently have 28 colonies, and keep planning to reduce! I qualified as a Master Beekeeper in 2014, and received the Wax Chandlers Award. In 2015 I qualified as a Certified Lecturer with the Federation of Irish Beekeepers. I am an examiner for the BBKA Basic, Healthy Bees, and General Husbandry Assessments. I am also Trainer and Treasurer for Dean Forest BKA for more years than I can remember!

My talk on "The Dancing Bees" is all about the Waggle Dance, explaining how it works, and the theories of the evolution of the dance. I will discuss the scientific studies and the controversies between Von Frisch and others. Also the use of the dance by Lindauer and Seeley to identify new nesting sites for swarms. The practical study carried out by Sussex University using the waggle dance to interpret available foraging areas over several seasons.

Directions

The Illchester Sports Pavilion is on Roman Road, Illchester:

Post code BA22 8NW.

To find the Pavilion from the A303; turn onto the A37 at the Ilchester turn off and take the first turning on the right (before Ilchester roundabout). This is Roman Road and the Pavilion is the first building on the left.

From Yeovil; take the A37 North towards Illchester. Take the first exit at the Illchester roundabout towards the A303. Take the next left turning left onto Roman Road. The Pavilion is the first building on the left.

October Joint Meeting: Monday 29th October

Our annual joint meeting with the SW Division follows hot on the heels of the regular meeting, only two weeks later, so make sure this is on your calendar as well!

The meeting starts at 7:30 pm in the Over Stratton Village Hall. Ged Marshall will talk about "Spring Management and Swarm Control".

Ged is a well known Bee Farmer, working about 300 colonies. He is a Master Bee Farmer and a well known queen and Nuc supplier of bees derived from Brother Adams stocks. So he certainly knows his bees.

Spring management leading to swarm control is one of the most important aspects of managing your colonies. This sets them up for the coming season (and honey crop) as well as preparing them for the winter and the next season.

Ged Marshall is a knowledgeable and engaging speaker so the joint meeting is a good opportunity to engage him. This is an event not to be missed!

The meeting is at the Over Stratton Village Hall. The post code is TA13 5LN and the parking area is the second entrance after the hall on the left.

September Meeting: Richard Ball talked about Pollen

Richard presented his interest in analysing the pollen collected by his bees and not the expected talk about Beekeeping in Malta. Our apologies to any members who were disappointed about the change in subject.

Richard has been collecting the pollen collected by his bees to see where they are foraging. This means collecting the pollen, drying it and then sorting it. This sounds easier than it actually is as it takes several days to sort one batch of pollen!

It then has to be identified. Again, not as easy as it sounds! There are several good references to help identify the pollen from the colour. But it does depend on the light and there is a natural variation in colour of the pollen. So to accurately identify the source of the pollen, each type was mounted on a slide to be viewed with the microscope - again, not a simple or quick task!

To demonstrate the difficulties, pollen grains vary from those which are individually just discernable by the maked eye to those which need a powerful microscope and Richard brought a couple of examples to view under the microscope.

A very interesting and enlightening talk, even if it was not the expected subject!

Please keep your eyes open for any hornets hawking on front of your hives and put out hornet traps to capture any predators. An invaluable monitoring device but do inspect and empty regularly!
