"The Asian Hornet and What we can do now"
7:30pm Tuesday 26th March 2019
at The Ilchester Pavilion

We have all heard a lot about this pest which is on our doorstep in France and the Channel Isles and is trying to get a foothold here in Great Britain. It will not be long before we will spy some here in the Yeovil Division. So what do we do and how do we counter it?

Lynne Ingram is the Somerset Asian Hornet Action Team (AHAT) leader. She has been to Jersey to assist with finding the many nests there and has written several articles describing the difficulties in tracking the hornets and exterminating their nests. She will address us on how to identify, capture, track and defend against this awful introduced pest.

It is vital that we are prepared for this pest. It has decimated the bees and honey crops in France, through Spain and Portugal. It will do the same here if we are not ready for it.

In preparation, SBKA have funded an Asian Hornet trap for every member. Andy is holding these traps and will bring them to the meeting to distribute. Sharon has the approved bait so you can assemble and prime your traps on the night.

Definitely a must attend meeting!

Directions

The Ilchester Sports Pavilion is on Roman Road, Ilchester:

Post code BA22 8NW.

To find the Pavilion from the A303; turn onto the A37 at the Ilchester turn off and take the first turning on the right (before Ilchester roundabout). This is Roman Road and the Pavilion is the first building on the left.

From Yeovil; take the A37 North towards Ilchester. Take the first exit at the Ilchester roundabout towards the A303. Take the next left turning left onto Roman Road. The Pavilion is the first building on the left.

February Meeting: Clare Densley talked about Pheremone Communication

A very well turned-out discussion by Clare Densley on Pheromone Communications with at least 11 members from Yeovil plus a large contingent, mainly from Somerset plus two new members which was fantastic to see. Clare travelled all the way from Devon (90 minutes away) and also spoke at the recent Lecture Day in Somerton.

Clare spoke methodically and informatively all about the amazing ways that bees communicate, namely through pheromones. She skillfully avoided too much inorganic chemistry lessons and described the many (10 or so) glands on the queen (in particular) that emit pheromones, many with long complicated chemistry names but were nicely summarized into 'basically this is what we think it does' sort of language. The talk concluded with a long question and answer session and the usual refreshments, courtesy of Andy Dobson. The key take-away was that we need to be careful about our perfumes and general 'smellies' we wear when going through our bees, but to remember that almost all bee-bee information is conveyed through tiny quantities of chemicals that are automatically and methodically secreted by the bees - the gueen, workers, drones, brood and even the comb. It was fascinating to learn that Varroa 'tunes' into the chemical signature from brood used to inform the colony that it needs to be capped, popping into the cell prior immediately before. Varroa also adopts the 'smell' of the bee so that the bee does not try to clean it off. We also learnt that the Varroa might not be tapping into the bees blood but rather the fat-bodies. We also learnt something fascinating about cutting grass and its affect on the bees but I'll leave that for those who attended. A fascinating talk that really makes us appreciate how little we know about the chemical world of bees and covered a vast emerging subject that we have only just scratched the surface of.

The Great Wax Exchange

It is time to plan your renewal of brood comb to reduce disease and improve the health of your colonies. An approach we have thoroughly recommended for many years. To make this renewal cheaper, you can make use of your spare beeswax by exchanging it directly for foundation. Malcolm will be attending the BBKA Spring Convention and undertaking a bulk exchange of wax (which gets a much better deal!). Subscriptions for 2019 are now overdue

Can I remind all our Yeovil beekeepers who have not yet paid their subscriptions that they are now overdue. I have to make the final payments to BBKA, SBKA and BDI on 20 March and unfortunately I will not be at the March meeting. So can I ask you to either send a cheque or if you prefer you can drop your payment off at our house.

After that date your membership will have to be lapsed and you will not have any insurance cover, BBKA News etc. so I hope you will re-join.

Subscriptions for 2019 are now overdue. The cost remains the same as last year, £32 for a full member, to include BDI cover for three colonies. This is £19 for BBKA, £5.50 for SBKA, £2 for BDI, £2 to the research fund and £3.50 for Yeovil Division. If you have more than three colonies you will need to add the following amount for BDI cover:

Asian Hornet Action Team

Asian Hornet

Do you have any camelias in your garden? Camelia are a favourite flower of the Asian hornet so do take a look; hopefully you will find nothing untoward.

Nick Fairweather and I attended the second SBKA Asian Hornet Action Team (AHAT) meeting last Sunday. We now have an Asian hornet 'tool box' so we are ready if there are any sightings of Asian hornet.

What does this mean, I hear you ask.

Well we all hope that it will not be needed but Nick Fairweather, Nic Bard and I will use this 'kit' to try to locate an Asian hornet nest after a possible sighting. If we do find one we will then be able to give the National Bee Unit (NBU) details of the location; they will then check our findings and if necessary, call in the authorised pest control people to destroy the nest. This system has been put in place to speed up the process by the searching being done locally before NBU are involved. This will become particularly relevant if NBU are inundated with sightings of Asian hornet this year.

What can you do to help?

- Be alert to what is around you and possible sightings.
- Collect your Asian hornet trap at the next Yeovil Beekeepers' meeting. The traps will come primed
 with an attractant. These traps have been purchased by Somerset Beekeepers (SBKA) and there is
 one for each member.
- Make other people aware. At the next meeting we will have display cards to go up in the libraries, garden clubs, parish notice boards, and anywhere where people might read them.
- Join the Asian Hornet Action Team. Just three of us is probably not going to be enough people if Asian hornets are sited in the 'Yeovil' area.
