Lionel's October Bee Notes

I find some of my small colonies still need feeding and I will continue until they stop taking it, but I was pleased to see most of them have plenty of stores and still have plenty of bees. The temperature is now dropping below 15°C so we should stop feeding sugar solution and change to fondant. This is because the bees may not have time to dehydrate the solution to store it before they go into their cluster, which will mean the solution will ferment and the bees will suffer with diarrhoea.

I have treated one apiary with Varroamed but consider the others will be able to handle the small number of mites in their colonies. I hope I am right. Time will tell.

I still have [at the moment] some Asian hornet traps and some Suterra bait. Please bring a small jar and collect from me if you can use it. Also [at the moment] and thanks to Bridget and Geoff, I still have some sheets of wax which can be made into flowers etc, and shown at our honey show. Again, just collect from me.



A good tip when using the traps, put the bait in a mini jar with a lid inside the trap with a wick [kitchen roll] through a hole in the lid, the hornet will suck the bait from the wick and not drown in the liquid.

An update on the Asian hornet situation. To date 53 nests have been destroyed in the UK this year, most of these were in Kent and along the south coast including Hampshire and Devon. Jersey have found 284. These are worrying figures so I must ask you to be observant around your hives, on fallen fruit and on Ivy which is now in flower. Don't forget use the Asian hornet app on your phone or if you can't do that report it to someone who does have the app.

News from the Apiary

Not a huge amount to report from Hooke Valley over the last month. We had a very informative morning carrying out Varroa testing on a couple of hives. One that had been treated with Apivar strips two weeks prior and one that had not. The results were very conclusive!! On a sample of 300 bees, the treated colony had a mite count of 2, the untreated colony 40 plus. There was no doubt that the colonies that were brought over from Carymoor carried very high levels of mites on arrival (we had to treat and re queen in order for them to survive). I also think we underestimate just how many bees drift/rob to other hives and possibly this was the causal factor as we saw no sign of varroasis on any other colonies during the season. I read with interest the article in the last BBKA magazine where a colony had absconded from an apiary and taken residence in a roof space nearby. When the colony was removed by the association two years later, they concluded that it would not have survived another winter due to the varroa mite load on the colony.

Aside from the above, I have been feeding the colonies inverted syrup. Initially the ones that were very light and now as the colonies are slowing down, the others that feel a little on the light side. The weather hasn't been great for the ivy flow and my colonies at home that are on weighing scales show the bees consuming the syrup but without notable colony weight gain. That might be good news for us humans when we get on the scales but I fear for the bees. This does not put them on a good footing for the winter and the window for feeding syrup is closing fast.

There are lots of different honey fudge recipes to choose from. This one was used by the Bournemouth & Dorset South BKA taken from their 2019 honey show schedule



Honey Fudge 1kg golden castor sugar 1 tin (397gm) condensed milk Pinch of salt 75gm unsalted butter

1 heaped tbsp dark soft brown sugar 100ml full cream milk 300gm honey



Line a baking tray with greaseproof paper. Put brown sugar, condensed milk and full fat milk into a heavy bottomed pan. Heat gently until sugar has dissolved.

Add castor sugar and again heat gently until sugar has dissolved.

Add salt and honey and boil to soft ball stage (114°C – 116°C).

Take off the heat and allow to cool for a few minutes. Stir in butter and beat for 5 minutes until starting to granulate. Pour into prepared tray and allow to set. Score into 25mm squares when nearly set and cut when cold. Enjoy!

<u>Asian Hornet Advert</u>

Although the advert is not being rolled out in our area, I have attached this message from Diane Drinkwater for your interest.



The trustees have agreed a budget of £15,000 for a poster campaign on the back of buses in areas affected by Asian hornets. A design has been created (see above) and this advertising will roll out across Kent, Devon, Southampton and the New Forest from 25th September. These areas had advertising space available at short notice.

This is the first time BBKA has carried out such a campaign and it will last for four weeks. It is costing a lot of money so we need to know how successful this is. Can Area Association Members in these areas please inform your members and let us know when they have seen the advert.

I have asked the trustees to agree to an additional budget for a wider campaign but I felt I must start this initial stage now and work on adding extra areas when we can. I also put a request into DEFRA for them to consider funding or contributing to this campaign but they have declined.

If your association would like to fund additional campaigns, please contact the office for details of the advertising company. I hope to be able to share more positive news about wider advertising in the near future but if you have suggestions on how we could raise awareness further, please let me know.
