Letter from the Chairman.

It feels likes the summer has gone in a flash – partly because of the lack lustre weather but also because a lot has been going on behind the scenes in SBKA.

Our beautiful and informative new website is live and I hope you enjoy using it and discovering more about SBKA and your own Division.

The design and functionality has been driven by how Members and the public want to access information; now the site works just as well whether you're using a PC, tablet or mobile. There are lots of new features

including a fully integrated calendar, photo gallery and Members' blogs and, for the first time, the Divisions' pages are autonomous. Naturally there will be a few teething problems, so if you spot any errors or problems, please use the site's Contact Us page to report problems to our new webmaster, Neil Cook. And, of course, I'd like to thank Neil (a Yeovil member) for putting in an incredible amount of work to create and populate the new site which I believe is the best Association website in the UK.

In the next few weeks the Executive will meet to discuss other ways in which SBKA can meet the challenges of the times and further engage with the public as requested by Divisions' delegates at our recent Council meeting.

Honey Shows - while the shows are popular with the public, relatively few Members enter the competitions. Can we learn any useful lessons from the most successful?

EFB - this year Somerset has the dubious honour of being the number one county for EFB, according to BeeBase. Can we rise to the challenge laid down by the NBU's Giles Burge, our Special Lecture speaker, who said we could eradicate EFB with the right measures?

Partnership with Ferne Animal Sanctuary near Chard - this summer Ferne invited SBKA to explore ways in which we might work together. A few of us, including South West Chairman Robert Kemp, spent several hours with Director (and beekeeper) Elaine Hayes walking around the site. Now we need to look at how we can develop a partnership in line with our aims and objectives and that works for Ferne, too.

And, finally, what a beekeeping year! I've heard reports that the harvest is one of the worst for years with totals down between half and two thirds on last year. I hope you have managed to pull your colonies through the difficult season and that you are one of the lucky ones – I met one beekeeper who has cropped 800lb from 20 colonies!

SBKA Special Lecture

25 April 2018

at Edgar Hall 8 Cary Court, Somerton Business Park, TA11 6SB Margaret Thomas, CSP, NDB will be speaking on the subject of "Swarm Control for the Busy Beekeeper".

Biographical details taken from the NDB website:

Margaret Thomas lived in Essex where she and her husband Dick learnt their beekeeping in the 1970s under the tutelage of Ted Hooper County Beekeeping Instructor at Writtle Agricultural College. She retired to Scotland in 2009. During the time spent in Essex she passed her BBKA examinations to become a Master Beekeeper and then went on to get her NDB in 1982. She then joined the NDB tutor team for the weeks' residential course held at the time at Sparsholt and later at York.

At Ted Hooper's retirement she joined the group of some 12 beekeepers led by Clive deBruyn (the newly appointed CBI) discussing varying topics and culminated in a two week stay with queen rearer John Keefus in Toulouse, France. The group spent the time grafting (with adapted matchsticks), making fondant, filling mini nucs, putting them out for mating and placing mated queens in travel cages ready for the post.

During the 39 years in Essex Margaret was an active member of the Essex Beekeepers and served on the CEC as Southend Delegate, Disease, and Examinations Delegate, managed the Essex Honey (Barleylands) Show for a couple of years and was awarded Life Membership of the Essex Beekeepers in 2010.

She is one of the Moderators of the BBKA Examinations Board and also tutors for the BBKA Correspondence Course.

She is a retired Bee Farmer – the BFA that represents commercial beekeepers in UK, and during that time managed between 40 to 60 colonies. As a bee farmer she served on the committee as Magazine, Pesticides, Minutes and Pollination secretary, the latter managing placing around 1000 hives in Kent on top fruit, some hives on borage and oil seed rape north of the Thames. Representing the BFA she joined a research group as the beekeeper providing the colonies for a project on pyrrolizidine alkaloids in ragwort and borage honey. She was awarded Life Membership of the BFA. Dick took over editing the Bee farmers Bulletin for some years.

Margaret has given lectures in a number of counties in England, Scotland, Ulster and also been guest lecturer a number of times at the weeks' course at Gormanston just north of Dublin. She has been the weeks' tour lecturer for Scotland twice.

She is now a committee member of the Scottish Beekeepers Association, where her brief is all subjects related to hive products. Beekeeping as an amateur with a limited number of colonies in a fickle climate is a new challenge. She continues to teach beekeeping.

She updated Ted Hoopers *Guide to Bees and Honey* and the *Beginners Bee Book*. Margaret is currently the secretary to the NDB Board.

THE COUNTY HONEY SHOW and Taunton Honey Show



Taunton beekeepers Jenny and Sid Gammon scooped the blue ribbon for the best exhibit at the Taunton and Somerset honey show held at Taunton Flower Show with their exceptional soft set honey.

Bulbs. Read this before you buy! Extract from The Guardian 30 September 2017

Recent articles in the newspapers have drawn attention to the fact that many bulbs are sprayed with pesticides and fungicides. **Neonicotinoids** are used as a flower bulb drench to keep aphids and other sap-sucking insects off plants, and are common pesticides in the bulb industry. The half-life of neonicotinoids is estimated somewhere between 34 days and three years as they break down in the soil; it is not only flying insects that are affected during that time, but bacteria, amoebae, worms and insects in the soil, too. Every bee that visits your bloom, every worm that tunnels around your bulbs, is tasting a tiny bit of poison.

The solution is not to give up planting bulbs, but to buy sustainably and naturally produced ones. Sites mentioned which sell organic bulbs include www.organiccataogue.co.uk, <a href="www.organicca

Taunton

One of the highlights of the Taunton season is extraction day when many of our beginners spend the day with David Pearce at his very well equipped premises.

This season our teaching apiary has 16 colonies and they produced a total of 330lbs; two thirds of the frames had to be cut out because the honey had granulated and only a few combs were suitable for cut comb.

Wedmore and Cheddar

We've had a good series of around My Hive meetings and a mixed result in terms of honey and diseases. Some people have had excellent honey crops and some have been a lot down on previous years. So much seems to depend on specific locations within the area. Varrroa has been a problem. Those people using icing sugar do seem to have come off better and some of us do question the efficacy of MAQS strips. It would be interesting to have some feedback on this from other divisions.
